It is amazing to learn more of God's love and the love He has for the ladies at FLC. It is an awesome feeling to know that God has been with me throughout my failings and my heartaches. Andrew asked the students to introduce themselves and one student responded with a testimony of freedom and purpose from Christ that had endured in his life like nothing else over the course of the last half decade.

At that same chapel, another student who had been relatively silent all year stated that he was a Christian and that he prayed with his grandmother. He also expressed a strong desire to have superpowers (a not uncommon fantasy seen constantly in the media these days). Please pray Mark 9:24 for MJ: 'I do believe; help me overcome my unbelief'! Pray also for Marcel to see answers to prayer and for strength as he works throughout the summer and continues to single-parent his children. Pray for GK and KK as they process God's call on their lives as it was shared to them.

Chapels in September will pick up with 11 closing books of the Bible we have yet to cover. 
# **Prayer**



"Getting wisdom is the wisest thing you can do!" Proverbs 4:7a

As I meet with residents I usually ask them what they would like prayer for. Many ask for prayer for their family, or their health, or that they can get their kids back. Recently one of our youngest residents stopped to think about the question I presented to her and then answered, "For wisdom." I was struck by this young person who could have asked God for anything and yet chose to ask for wisdom so that (in her words) "I would have my eye's opened to know what's right and make the best decisions." I responded by telling her that she had reminded me of a person in the Bible called Solomon who was also young and who also could have asked for anything, but realized he did not know it all, so asked God who did, for wisdom. I shared God's response to Solomon from 1 Kings 3:10-14; that God was pleased that Solomon had asked for wisdom and that because he asked for wisdom instead of all the other things he could have asked for like a long life, riches and the end of his enemies that He would also give Solomon riches and fame.

# People on the Street

"He was despised and rejected of men, a Man of sorrows and acquainted with grief and we hid as it were our faces from Him, He was despised and we esteemed Him not. Surely, He has borne our griefs and carried our sorrows; yet we esteemed Him stricken by God and afflicted. But He was pierced for our transgressions, He was crushed for our iniquities; upon Him was the chastisement that brought us peace, and with His wounds we are healed." Isaiah 53:3-5

Her name is Margaret. About 6 months pregnant. Addicted. Friday, July 7th 2023, she found herself outside our Family Life Centre on Pritchard Avenue. Pastor Gil takes up the story.

"I was just winding up the week and preparing for our community soup ministry. A glance outside told me there was a young lady in deep distress. I rushed out and was confronted with a person whose beautiful face had been pulverised and was covered in dried blood. Her bare feet revealed one foot badly swollen and one toe green, likely gangrenous. Very pregnant and very out of it, emergency was called. Police, fire department and paramedics showed up but could do little for an unwilling but clearly obviously needy and distressed individual who was rejecting help. Tears were forming in my eyes and I asked the young lady if she would accept prayer at least. She said yes. She shared her name and our Lord Jesus was called upon. He answered immediately. Margaret said 'thank you', and the emergency teams could start to serve her needs. Praise God. But who or what could have treated this child of God, this precious creation, with such evil disdain and such bullying consequences?"

Her name, we don't know. Thursday, July 6th her body was found on the sidewalk of Henry Street. She was found on her side, face down, with one arm behind her back. Likely drugs but we do not know. Did she have identification on her? Is there a


child or are their children, wondering where mom is? Is there a husband or a brother, a father or a mother, a boyfriend or a relative, missing what was a life just a few short hours before the terrible discovery? Will those she loved and those who loved her, ever know of her passing? How many people had walked by her corpse? Could she have been saved? The media coverage was subdued [non-existent], yet for the Creator of the world, our Saviour, He valued her life, the unnamed, that had led Him to lay His life down for her.

It was our responsibility to tell her about Jesus. How she didn't need to resort to drugs to mask the pain of trauma and the past we can only imagine and now never truly know. We hope this lady knew Jesus. People slip up. With addictions, a slip up can be fatal. Did she flirt with death as so

many addicts do? We have heard over and over "if I don't wake up from this next needle, then I won't have to face the pain that life is for me", beyond shocking. Dear church family, the need to share the Gospel, the need to serve others in the name of Jesus, the need to serve Jesus, is getting ever more urgent!

Thursday, July 6th, at the Misericordia Hospital in emergency was a beautiful young lady. From one side her face was pure and fresh, but when she turned, the other side was severely bruised and swollen and the eye could barely be seen. Beaten. Who are these bullies, who are these people, who are these men who would inflict such brutality on a precious life? Sadly, Jesus tells us, Scripture tells us, that we all have the capacity for the most grievous of sin. The good news is, that we all have capacity to bring the hope of Jesus to all people, with His amazing Gospel of grace and mercy.

Please keep praying. The battle for lives is very real!



# Prayer at the bubble! (or ... 'on the double'!)

The "Bubble" is the name we affectionately call our small reception office, located at our 320 Princess Street location. Here is the first point of call for many who live on the streets of Winnipeg, whether homeless, addicted, maligned or lost (or any combination of each) and when in need of water, food (pastries, bread, fruit), clothing or other requests. The "Bubble" is manned 24/7.

Monday morning Chapel for staff and residents takes place from 9:00 to 9:45 am. This affords some office missionaries a turn in staffing the Bubble and serving our guests who have needs and come to our door. We take names and prayer requests from all who are willing to share with us. From time to time, we note ethnicity. This knowledge may help us to encourage a parent or grandparent that we have possibly seen a loved one, "and can we pass a message on, should we see their loved one at our door again". (We are aware of privacy, even at the most desperate times in a person's life.)

Recently an addict was sharing an incident in his personal life. He was tempted to try what he called "white down". A drug laced with fentanyl. Within moments of taking it, he said "my heart beat really fast, I was being crushed; fortunately what saved my life was violently throwing up!" He then went on to share that earlier

in June, two people he knew had a different experience and a tragic outcome. They were an uncle and his niece. They had both booked to go to detox simultaneously. The uncle went ahead with his appointment but the niece bailed. Ten hours later and after using white down, the niece was dead.

When we serve the people at our door, when we serve Jesus, it is crucial that we do so in our Lord's love. Whilst we will always be able to serve Jesus, the particular image bearers of God, whose names we may or may not know, may never be seen by us again. So vulnerable to death are the addicted. So critical are your prayers.

Here follows a recent list from a couple of Monday morning chapels that missionaries on duty put together.


- J.J. Young tattooed Caucasian, carrying skateboard & polite.

- Cameron Clearly has not bathed in a long while. Wanted prayer for family and friends, although looked like they were not in his life right now.
- Rain "Just need to survive".

## A Redemptive Story

At 13 years old, he took a gun and shot himself. He failed in his attempt to end the misery of his life to that point, but his hurt was real. The youngest of four children, Clark's dad ruled the home with brutal fear. The imbibing sounds of a bully in action haunted Clark for years. The repeated sound of a strap smacked on to the flesh (Clark's), and the heavy sound of angry keys slamming on the family's kitchen table to announce that dad was home, were nothing compared to the silent sobs and cries of a mom, physically abused and verbally attacked. "Mom would pretend not, but I knew she was gas lighting. I saw through it. I could hear it in my head."

Surviving the gunshot, Clark found other ways to deal with his pain. He found himself drawn to older and stronger boys and did their bidding by breaking & entering homes. The 'fruit' of stolen property was largely enjoyed by the older boys. Clark was 'good' at it, but not so 'good' to avoid several times of arrest, ending in time spent at the Manitoba Youth Centre (MYC) in Winnipeg. This was basically a prison for youth. While there, "I was signed over to government care. My dad was officially disowning me."

During this time at MYC, Clark found himself being diagnosed by a psychologist and referred to a 9 month stay at the now closed Agassiz Youth Centre in Portage la Prairie. Here Clark was in a community where Positive Peer Pressure (PPP) was encouraged and sought after. (Find those who would make for good influencers.)

In addition to this, Clark was exposed to the three "C's": Check, Confront and Contain. Living in proximity with others brought a community of awareness. The start of an attitude towards something or someone may result in self-awareness. Check. If the attitude started to escalate, others would see it in you and Confront. If the attitude erupted, then you would be surrounded by your peers and Contained!

For Clark, it all failed, and at 18.5 years old, he found himself in Headingly Jail. The sentence was for 7 months of 'pure hell', carried out in the Remand Facility. Such was the time in jail that Clark resolved never to return. Nearly

4 decades later, that resolve has stood strong.

However, his natural inner strength still was to give way to drugs, drink and women, all the while working hard to play hard. Years followed years.

Cynical about working life and the employer / employee relationship, Clark finally decided to deal with his addiction to opioids and entered UGM for the first time, about 12 years ago. Here he met Jesus and had his first encounter with the Holy Spirit. It was a 'new high' for Clark and for a time, he had hope. Hope that mattered, finally. Sadly, between then and now, in the intervening years, Satan got 'his claws back into me, that's until a few months ago'.

A trip to a crack house where a lady he knew was selling fentanyl, ended when Clark awoke in hospital 3 weeks later from a coma. Clark had been robbed as he overdosed on the fentanyl. Unbeknownst to him, his brothers and sisters at UGM were praying hard for his recovery and his life. He was spared, praise God! Now, about 3 months after hospitalization and coma, Clark is working out physically and spiritually. He is hungry for more of Jesus and is happy to share his experience to a) honour God, and b) to encourage others.

Please pray for Clark as the Spirit leads. Please specifically pray that he will have the opportunity to be the father to his one child, son Clayton, that until now he has not been. Clark

wants to break the generational curse of selfish and ignorant fatherhood. He is leaning into Jesus. Clark shares his favorite verse, Philippians 4:6 "Do not be anxious about anything, but in every situation, by prayer and petition, with thanksgiving, present your requests to God."

### **Practicum at UGM**

I have been delighted to be involved with UGM about half-time as a volunteer for the past several weeks. UGM graciously welcomed me to do a placement as part of my education. I am studying in a Master of Divinity program. I am spending some of the time at 320 Princess, some of the time at Charis Centre, some of the time at the Family Life Centre. I feel very honoured to be serving individuals and families in these programs. Jesus loves everyone so much and some of His children don't know that He loves them.

Something that has really moved me has been getting to know the missionaries here. The staff are called missionaries because that is what they are. They have a mission. Each one I have asked has told me a remarkable story about how God called them to Union Gospel Mission and to the particular role they have here. I am inspired by their faith, their commitment and their passion for this work. Each one is crazy about Jesus. It's encouraging just to hang around them.

At the Princess Street location, I was surprised to find that I really enjoy helping in the drop-in. Before this experience at UGM, when someone on the street would ask me for money, I might give them some because I want to help and I hate to disappoint the person, but I knew that bit of money would not do any lasting good, so it would leave me feeling conflicted. In the drop-in, I actually have something to offer, even if it's a day-old bagel. But it's really much more than that. We offer the love of Jesus. I can offer to pray with a person. There is an option open to guests to listen to Christian music or to watch old Billy Graham sermons.

At Family Life Centre, it's a different feeling. Many of the women have been participating in the Wednesday program there for years, and I feel that it is the highlight of the week for many. It's an honour to hear a bit of a person's story. Many have complicated, difficult lives, but are walking through it with Jesus. The other week we rejoiced with a woman who had been baptized the previous Sunday. It was very special!
