Caroline's Baptism Testimony

Luke 15:3-7: So He told them this parable, saying, "What man among you, if he has a hundred sheep and has lost one of them, does not leave the ninety-nine in the open pasture and go after the one which is lost until he finds it? When he has found it, he lays it on his shoulders, rejoicing. And when he comes home, he calls together his friends and his neighbors, saying to them, 'Rejoice with me, for I have found my sheep which was lost!' I tell you that in the same way, there will be more joy in heaven over one sinner who repents than over ninety-nine righteous persons who need no repentance.

I invited Jesus Christ in my heart when I was a little girl. I knew there was a God but I didn't know Jesus personally. I knew He died on

the cross for our sins and rose on the 3rd day. I would go to LBE (Living Bible Explorers), Bible camp and Sunday church. But as I got older I stopped going. At age 16 I lost my best friend. That's when I lost all faith. I questioned God. "If He is so good, why did He let bad things happen?" Always why, why?

I started drinking, then pills. At 18 I did coke, then at 21, meth. I suffered a lot of trauma, pain and abusive relationships. I blamed God and others around me. I remember when I was sick of living like that and wanted to get help, but I couldn't stop using. My trauma kept haunting me. I tried to end my life a few times, but the Lord kept me alive.

I got into trouble and went to prison for awhile. I thank the Lord for that, cause I healed a little bit in there. I learned healthy coping skills and kept me safe from covid. I tried (to quit) the traditional way, but it didn't work for me cause I went back to my old ways and back to using.

I got reintroduced to Jesus from an ex-partner who is a drug dealer that was a Christian that had slid. His testimony was so powerful, I wanted that kind of encounter. He got me my first Bible and we went to a Holy Communion April 2023. That relationship didn't work cause I was still an addict, so was he. I sobered up a bit after, then met an evil person who hurt me and I got back into drugs.

I knew I didn't want to go back down that road once again, so I went into detox. There is when I realized I was powerless and needed Jesus. I couldn't do it on my own. I told Him to "take control and I will surrender my life, let's do it

Your way cause it's not working my way." So I read Matthew, Mark, Luke and John, and that's when I got to know my Saviour personally. Now I know Jesus, before I knew of Him.

Since coming to Charis, I've encountered Him in many ways. I was delivered from addiction. I repented of sins and turned to God and Jesus. It was the best decision and changed my life completely. I'm so in love with my Saviour, cause God is love. He has given me so much to look forward to cause I know He is with me and has me. I pick up my cross daily and follow Him, for the rest of my life. He is my redeemer, friend, my Saviour and Lord. I will praise Him forever and give all the glory to Him.



I want to get baptized to show my commitment to the Lord. I deny myself and give Him my life. My old self is dead and gone and this baptism is a representation of me, a new creation in Jesus Christ, and I belong to Him.



I came from a Christian home. I grew up knowing God. At the age of 12, I gave my life to the Lord. I would go to church and read my Bible, I had a good relationship with Him.

By 22, I had started drinking and using a lot and I had turned away from Him. I was an alcoholic for 15 years. Nothing or no human could help me. Because of my drinking, I lost my house, kids and family. I went to treatment but my sobriety didn't last long. I started drinking and using again. I felt alone, hopeless and worthless. My life was out of control. I was hurting my kid, family and myself.

I couldn't do this anymore so one day I prayed and asked God to help me stop. He led me here to Charis. I didn't think I would last here, but day after day, I was learning more about God and praying to how to have a relationship with Him. I repented of my sins and asked for forgiveness.

I remember the feeling, for the first time I felt so free. For the first time I could feel the love, a love so big that I could have never gotten from someone else.

My life changed drastically. I started to see things differently. The Lord God, the Lord Jesus has been so good to me and I am beyond grateful for all that He has done. He saved me from my addictions. He has completely given me a new life. A life filled with His light. He constantly gives me strength and is the reason why I breathe. He is my source of Joy, comfort and peace. Truly, He is deserving of all praise and glory. I love and praise my one true Lord.

I want to be baptised today to show God's redemptive work in my life and that He is the only one in whom salvation is found. Amen.

Hello! My name is Rebecca. I'm 18 years old, born in Revelstoke, BC. This is my testimony to you, but most importantly to God.

I truly came to know the Lord in April. I surrendered to Him a few months ago, at one of my old jobs with a sweet Christian client.

Although I didn't truly know Him as do now.

When I found the Lord is a different story. I was at a point in this world where nothing mattered to me, especially myself. I did anything to run and cope with the painful, constant thoughts; traumas, shame and fears. I never felt good enough to even pull myself out of it and honestly was stuck in a cycle of addiction, self-pity and self-hatred. I hit rock bottom in a matter of months without even realizing it at first. But then God was revealed to me. I surrendered to him within that month, but ultimately it's a choice I make everyday to Christ Jesus and myself.

Over the past couple of weeks I've gotten asked the question quite frequently "Who is God in your life?", so I'm going to tell you. God in my life is my hero, friend and Father. God knit me precisely in my mothers womb, He's always with me

and always has been. He knows when I sit and when I stand. He knows the words and thoughts even before I do! He knows ME and with that, the messiest parts too, but He loves ME!

Finding True Freedom, An Independant Perspective

How the Charis Centre, a ministry of Union Gospel Mission, is bringing the hope of Jesus Christ to women struggling with addictions in Winnipeg.

As a second-year student at Millar College of the Bible, I've had the opportunity to volunteer at the Charis Centre for the past seven months. Before attending Millar, I studied Social Work in university. In doing so, I realized that the world

does not hold solutions that are sufficient to undo the brokenness and to heal the wounds of those who are hurting. This left me eager to search the Scriptures and understand the hope that is found in the Gospel of Jesus Christ.

Understanding Addiction

When you think of substance addiction, what would you consider the opposite to be? Most people would say sobriety. In a viral 2015 Ted Talk delivered by Johann Hari, an enticing phrase was presented that would shape how professionals and the general public would approach addictions; a topic that no person remains untouched by. Over 30 million people have listened to Hari's profound ideas, many of whom were inspired to start new recovery programs, engage in further research, and advocate for political reform. Here's the concluding statement which gripped the hearts of so many people and compelled them to action:

The opposite of addiction is not sobriety; the opposite of addiction is connection."

The duration of the TED talk elaborates on how research supports this notion. He explains that his hypothesis began after an animal experiment observed that rats living in a community opted for normal water, whereas rats existing in isolation gravitated to water and at times consumed a lethal amount.

After further researching patterns related to human addictions, overdoses, and recovery, Hari concluded that addiction is more than "chemical hooks," rather, it is "an adaptation to your environment." He suggests that humans have an innate need to bond with each other, and the reason people choose not to use substances is because they have "bonds and connections they want to be present for."



While this sounds enticing and optimistic, one might confront it with the following question: In this digital age where we are theoretically more connected than ever before, why is the prevalence of addiction increasing?

Hari's TED talk briefly addresses this reality as well. He mentions that while the average amount of close friends a North American has is decreasing, the average amount of floor space a person has is increasing. Perhaps the shift towards independence and isolation

is a costly one. It is clear that connection is crucial to recovery; however, I would like to present a slightly different variation of Johann Hari's premise...

The opposite of addiction can be connection, but it depends on what/who you are connecting to.

With strong connections and meaningful human relationships, a person might be able to maintain sobriety, develop passions or interests, and make positive contributions to society; however, let us not forget that we live in a deeply broken and fallen world. People let us down. Always. Unforeseen circumstances happen, illness ravages, and tragedy strikes with or without notice. No amount of human connection can foster the resilience needed to navigate life in a world of this state and live with freedom, restoration, and healing. There must be something more.

At the Charis Centre, women struggling with substance abuse are invited to develop a relationship with the One who is unshakeable and unchanging. The mission exists to "bring the eternal life of Jesus to those who have lost hope" and to "help the less privileged by providing an opportunity for restoration, transformation, and healing." After interviewing two women in the program, it is clear God is using the Charis Centre to accomplish just that.

One lady explained that the other recovery programs provide tools to aid in the process, but the Charis Centre offers real hope that can be found in a relationship with Jesus. Without God's work in her life, she's certain she would be either in jail, dead, or in the psych ward. Now, she is learning to love God, herself, and others, and she has a smile that beautifully displays the joy she has found. Another woman shared about how she has spent her life longing to connect with God. While other treatment programs always felt like something was missing, this woman has found peace and strength in God's word. Despite hearing about Jesus at a young age, this participant explained that she "was always trying to find connection with God through all the wrong things, but God opened [her] eyes to the truth." Truth is, she did not have to earn God's grace or be "good enough" for Him. She shared that "it was hard to receive God's grace because it was just so good."

Neither of these ladies would ever venture to say that life is easy now that they have Christ, however...Ladies at the Charis Centre are learning to trust God's promises as they understand His character. Christians of all backgrounds and walks of life must remember: We are promised life will be hard, yet God sustains us. We know people will let us down, yet God remains faithful. We are promised that we are not enough, yet God is. We are sinners. But Christ died to save us.

The opposite of addiction is connection; however, a relationship with Christ is the only one with the power to save.

I've known Nora* for over four years. Her partner Jason*, who is significantly older than her, was in UGM's men's recovery when I started working at UGM in January 2020. Nora would come regularly with their toddler daughter and infant son to visit Jason. To help, I would engage with their daughter so that Nora and Jason could eat lunch and converse with each other.

Jason left the program early in 2020 but he and Nora and children would come by regularly to visit and join us for lunch. Sometimes Nora would come on her own, with and without her children.

Nora is quiet and reserved and a very good mother. Her love for her children is very evident. Part of her joy of coming to UGM was watching her children being loved on by the UGM staff. I enjoyed watching Nora as she would sit and serenely smile as she watched the different staff play with her children.

On this day, Nora had come alone. It was a miracle that she even found her way to UGM. She was so lethargic, slumping over with her eyes rolling back into her head. Despite her condition I could tell, by her responses, that Nora was listening to me. She was willing to listen but not willing to cooperate.

An ambulance was called, the EMS used Narcan to block the affects the drug was having on her, causing Nora to become angry, leaving UGM looking for her next fix.



Two visits later the drugs are not as strong in Nora. We are able to have a conversation. She listens intently as I share scripture of God's love for her and her need to submit to Him. But when I say that she is a good mother, Nora rolls her eyes up and looks away. Nora has accepted Satan's lies over her. I can tell that my words are not changing her mind. She is


willing to accept Jesus as her Saviour. I pray with her but Nora leaves UGM with the "I'm not a good mother" shame weighing heavy on her heart.

As I continue to pray for Nora, the hymn "Holy, Holy, Holy! Lord God Almighty!" comes to my mind. In particular the words "Holy, holy, holy! Though the darkness hide Thee, though the eye of sinful man Thy glory may not see; only Thou art holy, there is none beside Thee, perfect in power, in love, and purity". It is because of the perfect

love of God that Nora continues to come to UGM and it will be the perfect love of God that draws her to her knees. Praise our holy God, who is perfect in power, love and purity, and who is the only hope for the Noras and Jasons that UGM is called to serve. There is none beside Him! Ordered Steps

Kerry held on to Jesus, subconsciously through the many trials and tribulations of his early life. He knew in his heart that he was allowing the bad things to dictate his walk, but was not willing to submit or change. A 'drowning' at Camp Manitou when he was 6 years old shaped his life. He had jumped in the deep end and drowned' (his words). Within moments of drowning, Kerry felt surrounded by angels. He recalls hearing a voice, 'You will have a tough life ahead', then it all went blank. He was told he had drowned! Kerry would look back at this incident and know peace, from hearing in his heart – 'life will be alright in the end'. But it took years and years before Kerry would learn to accept God's help and recognize that He is in control and merits all the glory!

Kerry is living at UGM and has

successfully competed the men's recovery program at 320 Princess. He was working as a part time cook in another mission and in a commercial kitchen. To get to these jobs, Kerry invested in an E-Scooter and quickly learned that our streets are littered with potholes and irregular surfaces. One brush with the pavement had Kerry's family (we are a family at UGM), urge our brother to invest in a helmet. Teachable, Kerry wisely took the advice.

The new helmet arrived and Kerry had a little wrestle with himself to wear it the day it came! But wear it he did. Thank God! A vehicle drove

across Kerry's path. That helmet saved his head! Without it, we may be writing a different story. A shoulder was broken. Bones shattered. The driver didn't run, but neither did he seem to care for Kerry's injuries. Kerry himself was initially wondering whether God was disciplining him or punishing him. That quickly gave way to 'stuff happens', followed by "Praise God He saved my life again"!

"His love for me, directly and through my brothers, meant my head was protected from severe or fatal injury. As I reflect more deeply, He showed me that before this accident, my focus was to earn enough to be able to get my pilots license. But I was uncertain about that path. Now I am enrolled in Bible School and am at total peace. I always felt I had life covered, with back up plans for all situations. But I didn't see an accident coming. I didn't see God wanted my eyes open to Him and to let the Holy Spirit lead me in total surrender to my Heavenly Father. The bad life growing up (in one foster home playing with live ammunition in a vice grip and hitting bullets with a hammer, being one of many foolish activities), had led to bad choices as an adult, including the use of illicit drugs. I had many close calls in my life. God spared me."

"Lying on the operating table, not sure what all the surgeons were going to find, was fearful and then emotional as tears rolled down my face. God had saved me and I was going to recover and serve Him for the remainder of my life."

'Pastor' Kerry loves Jesus!

What do you say of a man who we all loved and miss so much? A man who over the years, battled addiction and battled the pain of rejection and self-worth. A man who had lived in our men's recovery program more than once. A man who early in 2023 was in a coma for 3 weeks. A man who the Lord delivered out of that coma (medically it seemed hopeless) and brought him back to his family at 320 Princess.

In the 15 months or so that Clark was with us, we witnessed him soar. His hunger for God's Word was an example to us all. His willingness to engage in conversation, share some of his journey, but listen as others spoke, was refreshing and healing. He was an intern and loved working

Clark turned 60 years old shortly before his passing at 320 Princess. He has left a wonderful legacy, while heaven gained a saint. It was a privilege to count him as our brother.

Fractured-Forgiven-Redeemed -Beloved of God

It was nearing the end of spring 2024 when we were informed that our friend and brother in Christ, Marc Joseph Soucy, had passed away. We were saddened to hear that the loving and good humoured gentleman we had so much affection for was no longer amongst us. Marc, at one time a resident of Union Gospel Mission Men's Recovery Program, had in

the past worked at the Mission and had also led a Christian Support Group for men overcoming addictions, where he prayerfully sought to support and encourage them not to lose sight of God's love for them. Marc found stretches of sobriety, but by his own admission, his journey was not an easy one. Even though Marc loved Jesus deeply and rested in the promises of God, Marc found the path to sobriety to be fraught with numerous hindrances and relapses in his adult years. Not many days before Marc's passing he made a

telephone call to his sister Mona. Among the topics, a poignant moment neared; as Marc made mention that he was extremely fatigued. He shared with his sister that he had asked God to take him home to be with Him. Before ending the telephone call, Marc told his sister that he loved her and she said that she loved him as well. That was the last that she heard from Marc, as it seems that God heard his prayer and acknowledging Marc's weariness, brought him home to be with Him soon thereafter. Yet, while she and her family, Marc's beloved mother Lucille, along with his siblings, as well as numerous relatives and friends grieved, Marc Soucy felt no such emotion, nor held any sentiment about the matter, as his days of being chained to a sin imbued world were over, and he was now present with the Lord. Marc knew his true home was in the company of his Creator

We read in Holy Scripture in 2 Corinthians 5:8, "Yes, we are of good courage, and we would rather be away from the body, and at home with the Lord."
