Extraordinary You!? Extraordinary Bill!? It Is All Jesus

Dear reader, do you know how extraordinary you are? Doesn't Scripture pronounce that you are "fearfully and wonderfully made" (Psalm 139:14)?!

In my role at UGM I am privileged to meet so many incredible people who the Lord uses to impact His work at UGM. Not all have had harrowing and traumatic lives; some in fact, have, by comparison, been quiet and uneventful... that is, until Jesus steps in! He brings all of us into life eternal. All of us who repent of our sinful ways, recognize the blood Jesus shed for us on the cross, ask for forgiveness & embrace the gift of amazing grace!

One such extraordinary person I visited recently was Bill Massier. Living in a modest apartment in Arborg, MB, Bill shared his own incredible story with me this past month, June 2025.

Bill found Jesus Sunday, April 5, 1982. He had recently been released from gaol having served time for stealing to fund his habit, an often repeated event which prompted the judge to comment, "You make a ---- poor criminal as you get caught all the time." Bill was tired of his alcoholic addiction and gave his life to Jesus. 'Caught by Jesus!'

The next 4 decades were remarkable. Married to Donna, Bill had a deep love and a great desire for serving others hopelessly lost in addiction. Whether serving with the Salvation Army, serving at Siloam Mission, or serving with a mission in San Antonio, Texas, Bill was keen to share Jesus with his devoted wife by his side. (Bill also volunteered at UGM for many years and up until last year was a regular preacher of the Word before our guests from the streets of Winnipeg had supper).

Summer time saw Bill & Donna at Winnipeg Beach, holding services outdoors on Sundays, proclaiming the name of Jesus (they had purchased a place there). To provide for their family, Bill & Donna became realtors in the '80s. "Donna got a 96 percentage pass mark to attain her realtor license. As for me, I barely passed with 78 percent!" They were successful but being on call all the time interfered with their volunteering and serving others. It was a challenge that led them to guit and buy a furniture business and move to Broadview. SK. But to know Bill is to know that this is no ordinary man. Volume was his mantra, modest profit his goal, helping others afford his wares the mark of a man giving to others ahead of himself. It was thus no surprise that this generous man found himself selling the business at a loss, although the goodwill credit he had earned in the community and indeed in the furniture world, could not be expressed in dollars but in love. God's love for people. Bill's witness.

To today. Picture the scene. Bill is about to move once more to even more modest accommodation with Manitoba Housing in Arborg. He is surrounded by cardboard boxes, including 4 boxes packed full of sermons he has preached. (Despite only achieving a grade 8 education, Bill has a degree in Biblical counselling!). He graciously offers the sermons to UGM (so blessed), but first wants to revisit them himself as he is seeking one in particular. He talked of his failing health and his preparedness to join his wife, Donna, in eternity with Jesus. He paused to tell me how painful it was to be without his precious wife and how beautifully she had passed to be with her Lord and Saviour. It is all too raw and recent. As he paused in memory of Donna, I reflected on the energetic and sacrificial and selfless life of this man and his dear wife. I thought of Oswald Chambers and how, after his passing, his wife Biddy found all his writings and put together many books, the most famous of which, "My Utmost for His Highest" has sold over 13 million copies worldwide. What gems, what insights, what Holy Spirit inspired sermons is Bill leaving behind in this world? Forty plus years of sharing Jesus.

Bill is in his 80s. Has little in the way of possessions and wealth, but masses of richness in the legacy he will leave (I am in no hurry to see him depart because he is a wealth of knowledge and spiritual insight). Bill has given himself, his material wellbeing, away. More importantly, he has given the love of Jesus and the message of the Gospel, away to all who will accept the grace of our Lord.

Bill prays for UGM and we in turn pray with gratitude for this special "extraordinary you." Bill. Praise the Lord.

Footnote: Bill attends a small, 10 strong local church. Despite mobility issues he longs to carry on preaching, sharing Jesus and seeing this congregation grow tenfold. While he still has breath, he speaks Jesus.



A Special Meal

We often use the term "special meal" or "special event" to describe the community meals we provide for our members. It makes me wonder: what truly makes these events special? I reflected on this question during our community BBQ on May 31st at the Family Life Centre. Several factors stand out when I think about how the event came together, all of which contribute to its specialness.

Initially, this BBQ was merely a dream until our friends from Millar mentioned they had a youth group from Austin, Manitoba, interested in serving. This opportunity made the BBQ feasible. When we found ourselves in need of more volunteers, a young adult group from Grace Life Community Church reached out, offering to help on that specific day. We had all the volunteers we needed. Could it be that the volunteers are what makes the event special?

Regarding the food, we wanted to offer something unique on top of the standard hot dogs and burgers, so we decided on homemade potato salad. This required us to prepare 150 pounds of potato salad, which meant peeling, cutting, and

two days: the first day was spent preparing the ingredients, while the second day involved mixing everything according to our head cook's instructions. On the day of the BBQ, we served over 360 meals, and the food received rave reviews.

Could it be that the food is what makes the events special?

What would a community event be without entertainment? We were fortunate to have carnival games and a bouncy castle for the children. These attractions were a big hit, bringing joy as the kids played and laughed together. Are the games what make the event special?

Each of these elements holds significance as we witness God moving in the planning and execution of the event. One thing we always do is share the Gospel at these events. 1 John 2:2, "He is the propitiation for our sins, and not for ours only, but also for the sins of the whole world." The words in 1st John are so profound because what Jesus did on the cross is the most special aspect of our lives, and having the privilege of sharing the good news of His love and sacrifice, offering forgiveness for our sins to those who believe in Him. That is what makes the events special! All glory be to God!

The 2024-2025 school year is now behind us. Throughout the school year there were many struggles, challenges and hardship for some students. Our Lord has created each one of us a little different. For some, the school year was a welcomed challenge, and for others it was a constant battle to remain focused. We had two students graduate grade twelve this year. For the students, it must have seemed to be an eternity of endless work.

One of our graduates came to see me after graduation. She came with a card in hand wanting to personally thank me for all the years that I was there to encourage and support her. I first met her in Kindergarten and had many conversations with her over the past twelve years. Every time we met, she insisted on giving me a hug, and the final time in my office was no different. After chatting for a few moments she told me

that she was so excited to see how the Lord would direct her path for the next season of her life. After opening the card she gave me, I began to weep. Inside was a grad picture and a very sweet note. "Well I did it! I graduated! And I blame our routine hugs every time we saw each other for keeping me going for 12 years." She thanked me for being there when needed and listening to her with a genuine interest. Before leaving, she left another card with me to send to her donor who also supported her for many years.

Scripture tells us to "Train up a child in the way he should go, and when he is old he will not depart from it" (Proverbs 22:6 NKJV). It's these moments that make all the struggles and challenges in front line ministry work all worth it! What an incredible ministry UGM's Christian School Program is.

What we model, matters. What we say, matters. What others observe, matters. Who we are becoming in Jesus really matters. Here follows a story that matters to Jesus.

A little over 10 years ago, a man left the Anchorage addictions recovery program on Henry Avenue and 5 minutes later walked through the 'flagship' blue doors of Union Gospel Mission at 320 Princess St. Unknown to the man at the time, he was about to embark on a 10 year (and counting) journey of walking with Jesus in the company of those who lived, loved, and served out of the building behind those blue doors, but whose sole desire was to share the most critical and valuable thing that matters eternally, a relationship with the Saviour, Jesus Christ.

At Anchorage, Barry (for that is the man's name!) had been encouraged to attend other recovery programmes, three times a week. He found 'Overcomers' at Union Gospel Mission (UGM), in large part with thanks to another patron of Anchorage programmes. Here, Barry was to meet UGM missionaries, Ben, Mark, Fred, & Chris, all of whom were used by the Lord to touch Barry's life.

The year was 2015, and the date March 2nd—doubly significant as it was Barry's birthday—when he walked through those blue doors. A 5 minute journey, drenched in significance.

As Barry looks back and shares his story with me,



he reflects on a milestone in his Anchorage days. A lady counsellor had stepped into the pulpit as a last minute replacement for Pastor Randy one Friday evening at chapel. She illuminated the word 'grace,' its meaning. Barry listened, questioned her after her sharing, and was moved to tears as he began to understand that grace was a gift, undeserved favour from the Lord Jesus Christ. Barry could not earn it, he didn't need to hustle to have the gift of grace. It was his to receive through repentance and total surrender. Barry became more earnest in reading his Bible. It was actually a New Testament given to him at his request by someone at Siloam Mission. "Read the book of John" was the advice he took, advice which was endorsed by Senior Chaplain Mark Kelm, preceded by the advice to pray before reading.

In those early days at UGM, Barry was impacted by the love others had for him. Fred called him 'brother.' His son, Chris, prayed a simple yet heartfelt prayer over him. In the programme, Chaplain Mark invested many hours in counselling and sharing Jesus with Barry, and so moved were they in recognizing more deeply the richness of His grace that they shared tears. Precious times. Mark would give Barry Scripture passages to read and one of those included Jeremiah 29:11 which was to become Barry's life verse. "Whatever I read in the Bible, I automatically believed in my heart." God was getting a hold of Barry's heart. As Barry grew, so did his conversations with God grow, and Barry's often repeated prayer, "Whenever you are ready, please give my daughter back." The Lord expected conversation and daily Bible reading and prayer were vital components of that. Still, Barry's heart ached for his estranged daughter. "She was key and GOD DOES NOT TEASE US! Gradually my daughter came in & out of my life. I would pray but Jesus just jumps in first. He is sovereign. He has His way. Don't fight Him!"

Dear reader, Barry had been a notorious drug dealer for over 30 years. He had established quite a network of suppliers, runners & users. He himself

was addicted to crack cocaine for 20 of those years and had accumulated 7 years jail time for his crimes. It was during those years that he lost his relationship with his daughter. In his own words, "I was at war with God. I was rejected by my six surviving siblings. Two had passed. We are Eritrean by birth."

Chaplain Mark would constantly encourage Barry to forget the absence of God (although, dear reader, we know it is us who go absent) in his past life and instead concentrate on and embrace God going forward. Daily. Together they determined the sheer horror that would be hell and the absence of God that fuelled that horror.

Barry reflected on his past. The violence, the anger, the madness and the disdain he had for others. So contrary to the peace, the love, the joy, the compassion, and hope he now has.

From the outset of his time with UGM, Barry cut all ties with his network in the drug world. Phone numbers were removed. He was very careful, especially in the early days of UGM, to remain 'home' and always to ensure he had another resident or trusted person to accompany him on the 'outside.' Barry recalls two incidents with physical encounters or observations with his past. On one occasion he spied his main contact supplier for drugs on a seat at Polo Park. A man who would sell 10-15 ounces of cocaine at a time, \$10,000 to \$15,000 a deal. Fortunately enough time had passed that Barry was not recognized and an encounter was avoided. On another occasion, Barry talks of "guys who used to work for me, stopping their vehicle and asking for contact details of my former supplier. I watched from the sidewalk as they pulled away and tore the paper with the phone number they had given me to shreds." Barry was tearing off his past.

"You cannot be a new creation in Jesus by holding on to any of the past. You have to be in 100%. We have received the gift of grace." - Barry. Barry remorsefully shares how he used to manipulate his 'market' for drugs. He was at pains to not glorify the past. Young guys would call him.

They wanted to show off to girlfriends their access to drugs. Barry would encourage the usage and would go after their monies with greed. "If offered a free hit, any addict would say, 'yes'. Get them hooked and by the end of the night, their paycheck would be gone."

Oh, but now what a life Barry leads! "Blessed beyond measure." "Nothing I would ask for - I have all I need." "My daughter is restored and I have four wonderful grandchildren. I am 'Papa Bear.'" "Every morning, at 4:30 am, I talk to the Lord. 'Father, help me to do a job because of Jesus."

At UGM, Barry is a critical cog in the provsion of food, clothing, water, from a network of amazing supporters to the work of Jesus in our 7 ministries. "I still hustle but for good purposes. I have built networks. I am protective of my connections. My mentality is that I work for the Lord now and I will be the best in Him that I can be. When I say 'I have', it's all Jesus who has!" - Barry.

Barry reports to the Operations Manager, Daniel. Daniel has a younger, older brother relationship with Barry. They encourage one another, they pray together. "Daniel is the first one I turn to. to share what I am faced with on any given day. We pray together. Turn to the

Sometimes God seems to use drastic measures to get our attention, but I guess God knows what will get our attention. May we always have a tender heart towards God's voice; be listening to Him and seeking Him out regularly so that when He is trying to get our attention, we're listening and ready for it.

At the start of 2025, we felt led by the Lord to begin doing the Alpha Course as part of our Wednesday Ladies Day here at the Family Life Centre. For those who are unfamiliar, it is a 15-session evangelistic tool that involves discussion and a shared meal, as well as a teaching series that focuses on taking the listener through the core principles of the Christian faith. It is introduced as an 'opportunity to explore the meaning of life', and that is what it has been for the 50+ women who have attended each week. We've explored questions like 'Why did Jesus die?', 'How can I have faith?' and 'How do I pray?' and it truly has been a wonderful opportunity to understand the basics of why and

how we follow Jesus.

At the end of each session we have taken time to pray and give opportunity for those who would like to ask Jesus into their lives for the first time, as the Lord moves them. It has really been a privilege for us to witness His saving grace at work as 32 women have given their lives to the Lord since this course began four months ago. The Father's love, both fiercely relentless and impossibly gentle, is quite miraculously evident as each woman has responded to Him for the first time and walked into His free gift of new life.

"The Lord is not slow in keeping His promise, as some understand slowness. Instead He is patient with you, not wanting anyone to perish, but everyone to come to repentance" (2 Peter 3:9).
